

Parish Council News January 2022

NHS Outpatient Assessment Centre

South Walks House, the Dorset Council offices in Dorchester, is set to become an NHS Outpatient Assessment Centre for six months. This initiative will bring a range of outpatient services together under one roof as well as health and wellbeing advice and information services. The South Walks House centre is part of a Dorset wide 'Think Big' initiative to help reduce waiting times and bring diagnostic services closer to the community and is one of the first of its kind in the country.

Funding to improve insulation

Dorset Council has also been awarded £98,000 of Government funding to insulate the most poorly insulated rented homes in Dorset. In the coming months landlords with properties with low EPCs will be invited to apply for grants for improvements such as insulation, solar panels and more efficient boilers.

Household Support Fund

Dorset Council has been awarded £2,294,941 from the Government's Household Support Fund which has been set up to help vulnerable households across the country in need of financial support. Some of the money allocated to the council will be used to make sure children who receive free school meals during term time will have food vouchers over the Christmas, February half term and Easter school holidays. Information about access and eligibility for food vouchers will be shared with families direct from their school.

One-off winter energy vouchers of £200 will also be made available to households in receipt of Universal Credit with limited capability for work or, earnings below the free school meals and free prescription threshold.

At least 50 percent of the Household Support Fund will be used to support vulnerable families with children in Dorset. In addition to food and winter energy vouchers, other targeted emergency local assistance will be available including support for care leavers, people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness, and people using food banks.

For the attention of residents of the Glebe and approach roads

The annual inspection of the Glebe Lombardy Poplar trees is due to take place in January 2022, subject to weather conditions. This inspection requires the use of a Mobile Elevated Work Platform (a very large cherry picker) which is required to facilitate inspection of the crowns and aged branches of these specimens. Please be advised that road access immediately adjacent to the site position of these trees may be restricted during these inspections. As I receive confirmation of the inspection date (and maybe a time), I will advise the community.

Domestic Abuse Strategy

Tackling domestic abuse has been a priority for the council and organisations in Dorset for many years and this year the Government passed legislation in the form of the Domestic Abuse Act 2021 that places specific responsibilities on Councils, including creating a domestic abuse strategy.

Dorset residents and stakeholders were invited to have their say on the draft strategy that will set out how Dorset Council will work with organisations and communities in Dorset to tackle domestic abuse over the next three years.

Funding agreed for SEND Strategy

Dorset Council has agreed £37.5m over the next five years to help deliver its new strategy for children and young people with special needs and disabilities (SEND). The funding will support the new Centre of Excellence (the former St Mary's school in Shaftesbury), of existing special schools and expansion of facilities in mainstream schools, such as Inclusion Hubs. The aim is to ensure more of Dorset's SEND children can attend a local school, rather than having to travel great distances, sometimes out of county, to receive the support they need. Independent provision costs about £60,000 per year per pupil whereas provision in one of Dorset school's costs around £22,000.

Cllr Somper will continue where possible and subject to Government guidance, to engage in carry face-to-face meetings with residents and intends to hold regular ward/village walks in the Beacon Ward. Cllr Somper intends to invite the Leader of Dorset Council, Cllr Spencer Flower for a ward tour and will be hosting a joint ward meeting with Portfolio Holder for Customer and Community Services, Cllr Laura Miller whose responsibilities include: Environment & Wellbeing, Regulatory Services & Community Safety, Waste Services and Customer Services & Libraries

Gore Clump

Local consultation is currently underway for approval on the improvement works at Gore Clump by Compton Abbas airfield. The work to pull all the different landowners and stakeholder groups together has taken far too long, but now details on previous objections have been addressed the legal process of consultation can take place. Dorset Cllr Somper continues to engage with the four Parish Councils that this significant piece of land sits in; to ensure they have been kept informed of all the planned work and are in regular discussion with Portfolio Holder and Highways Officers. It is anticipated that any works to the area will not require disruption (road closures) to surrounding roads i.e. A350/C13 as the main work is to be completed away from the main road.

They played hits 'Tiger Feet', 'The cat crept in' 'Dynamite' and 'Lonely this Christmas' which incidentally was the UK No. 1 in 1974.

One memory was the lead singer Les Gray mercilessly flirting with all the women in the audience

I live in Cumbria now but lived in Shroton for 35 years until 2009, still love the village and return when I can.

I have written to the Young Farmer's group to see if I can find out why they came to be playing here in Shroton. Nothing has come back yet, but perhaps readers can add their memories.

The January Stars

Take advantage of our lack of light pollution and look up at the skies.

January 17: Full Wolf Moon

The first Full Moon of 2022 rises on Monday evening, January 17. The Moon will appear full for about three days around this time, from Sunday evening through Wednesday morning. It's known in some cultures as the Wolf Moon. There are alternative names as well.

After the full Moon on the 16th, the brightest planet visible will be Jupiter, appearing 20 degrees above the southwestern horizon. Much fainter is Saturn, appearing to the lower right of Jupiter at only 2 degrees above the horizon and setting 15 minutes later.
