

PlusBus Community Transport (Dorset Community Transport)

PlusBus currently operates a 16 seater bus to Salisbury on alternate Tuesdays from

the bus shelter opposite the Talbot leaving at 9.20am with the return journey

departing Salisbury at 12.30pm.

To use this service you must be over 60 years and, if you have a bus pass, you

travel free of charge.

You may use the service without a bus pass for a fare of £8.00 return.

However, this is not a normal request or 'hop on' service and prior registration of

membership is essential - and free. An application form for membership can be obtained by calling 01258 287987

Once membership is confirmed a seat on the bus, when required, needs to be reserved by calling the same number.

Shroton Rectory building

According to Hutchins (the book of Dorset) in ancient times the rectory (Church and land) belonged to Christchurch Priory, which provided the parish with our Rectors. In Edward VI's reign the rectory was granted to the Duke of Somerset and then at his attainment, back to the Crown. It was purchased by the Freke family, together with the Manor in the 16th century.

In the mid-1400s "a cottage and a close of pasture containing 1 rod and 2 acres, once belonging to the Knights Hospitallers then to Sir Thomas Seymour, were granted to the Earl of Bedford". I believe this describes the current site of the Rectory which also measures 2 acres and 1 rod. [A rod = 16.5 feet or 5.02m]

According to the custom of the Manor, the parson of Ywerne had the right to keep 8 beasts and 1 bull on the Common free of charge. The Prior of St John of Jerusalem could keep 2 pigs and 22 sheep on the Common free of charge. I am not sure if the parson and the Prior are one and the same... the customs were established in early medieval times.

The present building was built in 1822 by a Shaftesbury builder, Thomas Johnson, and cost £1,370. The beautiful trees in the garden were planted in 1830. The two rear bow windows were added in 1901, as well as three new attic rooms and staircase. Also hot and cold water and a bathroom.

The old Rectory building was a dire state of repair in the late 1700s when the Reverend Martin died insolvent in 1771. It had an old bow window at the front with 3 stones carved:

- 1. IHS
- 2. a hare courant and a rebus of Robert Harry's, rector here in 1509
- 3. A chalice/cup.

The first known Rector was Eustacian de Hinton in 1295. (Robert Harry's has a named Chantry inside Christchurch Priory, dated 1525.)

The Rectory was occupied by the Army and then the American Army during WW2 and it was left in a very poor state.

Rev Taylor and family moved in after the war, and he is remembered as a lovely community active Rector. He was the last resident Shroton rector and died in 1971. The Rectory was sold and currently belongs to a Social Housing Association.

A United Kingdom is based on extraordinary true events. In 1947, Seretse Khama, the King of Botswana, met Ruth Williams, a London office worker. They were a perfect match, yet their proposed marriage was challenged not only by their families but by the British and South African governments. The latter had recently introduced the policy of apartheid and found the notion of a biracial couple ruling a neighbouring country intolerable. South Africa threatened the British: either thwart the couple or be denied access to South African uranium and gold and face the risk of South Africa invading Botswana.

Iwerne Courtney & Stepleton Parish Council - Meeting summary 18th January 2023

The Parish Council is waiting for confirmation of the date for felling the Lombardy poplars.

Dorset Council have now published the timetable for the 2024 Local Council elections. Those eligible are asked to begin considering if they wish to be nominated for membership of Iwerne Courtney & Stepleton Parish Council:

It was agreed to set a precept of £5,000 for the year 2024/2025, which would require a £ 1.65 addition to Council Tax Band D for the year.

<u>Planning application P/LBC/2023/07325 - Stepleton House A350 - Carry out internal works to the main house, east and west wings.</u>

There were no objections to this application.

The Parish Council has concerns regarding the absence of wildlife in the chalk stream and is considering a project to examine local water quality.
