Shroton Tithe barn and Dove cote farmyard.

This farm and land was traditionally for many years the lord of the manor's own land called the Demesne. Both the Tithe barn and Dove cote are listed as being built in the early 1600s and there is still graffiti on the walls of the barn, including the dates '1790, 1888, 1752' and pictures of daisy wheels which were traditionally used to ward off evil.

The barn is a traditional threshing barn with the two big cart doors opposite each other, so that whilst threshing the cut corn in the doorway of one side, the dust and rubbish would be blown out the other door. The dove cote housed doves and pigeons which were farmed for their meat and eggs for the lord of the manor whose mansion was situated just behind the church. Mr John Knight, a late village resident, said as a boy he saw handcuffs attached to the beams, which were rumoured to belong to Cromwell's troops after the capture of the Dorset clubmen on Hamble-

There was also a beautiful granary building situated near the Main Street end of the yard, raised off the ground to stop rats getting to the grain. Sadly, this was demolished in 1972. Villagers paid their tithe (a percentage of anything they grew) to the village rector and it was stored in the barn. This continued until 1836 when only landowners then had to pay money. The rector was also granted his own land in the village by the lord of the manor, and these fields were both in Shroton and Farrington. He rented out this land to local farmers. The Glebe was the last field to be sold by the resident rector in approximately 1969.

In 1632 Robert Kennell held the Demesne farm of 226 acres, at a value of £368 rent. This included land in Iwerne which we now know as Park Farm and the rights to Shroton Fair tolls. The farm was bought by the Ranston family in the 1918 village sale and was a working farm until the 1990ss when the Tithe Barn, Dovecote and farmyard were sold for private housing.

I remember as a child, the annual Spring farm sheep shearing which was carried out in the barn. All the sheep on the farm were herded into the farmyard, then into pens at one end of the barn. I got such soft hands rolling the fleece.

The Oasis Plant Centre


